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Strengthening Threads and Building Bridges

Editor's note: the following speech was delivered at Campaign Kickoff on August 28. It has been edited for space.

I grew up in Chattanooga. I went to the College of Charleston where I studied art. I am going to be honest and let you know a secret; I said years ago that I would never live in Chattanooga. I laugh at myself now, because I said the same thing about living in New York and I did that for 8 years, teaching art at the Children's Museum of the Arts in SOHO. I am very passionate about art. It has introduced me to amazing places, and introduced me to inspiring people, too. It is interesting how my passion in art has led me on an incredible journey.

In July, Rachel Privet, Rob Lowe, Alison Lebovitz, Michael Dzik, and I went on the Campaigners' Mission to Israel. We met and heard from so many inspiring people from organizations that our campaign dollars support. I visited France for a few days before joining everyone in Israel, to see the art and the museums. Because I have been reading about and researching Nazi-plundered art, I wanted to see a few works in person.

I landed the morning of Bastille Day in Paris. I felt a little uncomfortable being in France because I was Jewish. I could not imagine being young and wanting or needing to leave my family and friends behind in the country of my birth. Do you realize in the last 18 months, 21,000 French Jews have immigrated to Israel? At this rate, in another 20 years there will be no Jews left in France.

One of the organizations our overseas dollars support is the Jewish Agency, whose mission is to inspire Jews throughout the world to connect with their people, heritage, and homeland, and empower them to build a thriving Jewish future and a strong Israel. One of the inspiring conversations we had was with a Jewish Moroccan woman who works for our Jewish Agency and who knows exactly how many Jews are in "at risk countries" In Egypt there are 20 Jews, in Lebanon 12 Jews, in Pakistan 10 Jews, in Yemen 45 Jews. It is very hard to get these Jew out of these countries into Israel. There really are no diplomatic ties with many of these countries with Israel, or direct flights. Most of us know how Jews are treated in some of these countries; I could not imagine being a Jewish woman living in Yemen right now, knowing how the radical Islamists treat women, let alone Jews.



The Collective Conscience

The power of the collective. It has a nice ring to it, doesn't it? In simple terms, this is exactly what your Jewish Federation is – the collective.

By making an annual gift to the Federation, you are stating that you believe in the core mission of the Federation, that the Jewish community is responsible for taking care of one another. You are stating your support for the programs and services provided to the community for the benefit of the community. Providing services such as a social worker, nurse, transportation and meals – these are just some of what we offer, that grow out of our core values as a people and a community.

By using the term collective we are also talking about unity. Another goal of your Jewish Federation is to build and foster a unified, and therefore stronger, Jewish community. Because it is true that "united we stand, divided we fall." Living in a smaller Jewish community makes it easier for us to work together on various programs and issues. The community Yom HaShoah and July 4th party are two that immediately come to mind. The Federation also leads the Community Relations Committee, which is both proactive and reactive when Jewish issues come to the forefront. The monthly *Shofar* newspaper keeps the entire community informed of the happenings throughout the community – at Mizpah, B'nai Zion, Chabad, Hadassah, CJCRS, and throughout the region and nationally.

For over 20 years, the Federation has financially supported the congregational Sunday school program, CJCRS. Additionally, the Federation offers many resources to the CJCRS leadership. Aleph Bet Children's Center is another Jewish educational offering for our youngest community members and in many cases, is the first step in families' lifelong engagement with the Jewish community. PJ Library, which is sponsored by your Federation, provides one Jewish book a month to children and families free of charge. In this way they are able to build a Jewish library, one book at a time, to connect young families to the community. Imagine that! Thankfully, we don't have to imagine it; for Chattanooga families, it is a reality!

Our community Shlichim Program is another great example of how much richer we become as a community by supporting the collective. Our shlichim work in all of the community Hebrew schools, Aleph Bet and CJCRS educational environments. They work to create meaningful and worthwhile Israel programming to engage and connect. They also engage the general community by creating programs for schools, churches and civic groups.

The collective is also looking at the global Jewish community. Through our overseas partners JDC (Joint Distribution Committee) and JAFI (Jewish Agency for Israel), we provide similar programs and services, along with aliyah. Millions of Jews around the world feel the Chattanooga power, the power of the collective dollar, each and every day. Knowing that a Jew in Siberia received a meal today – knowing that a family in Paris made aliyah today – knowing that family in Minsk attended a Jewish educational class today – knowing that a child in Israel has an after school STEM program to better his or her future – all of these things we know happen because of you and us. THAT is the power of the collective.

All of this (and more!) is provided through the collective dollars that are raised each year. Additionally, how and where the money is spent is decided by you, the community, by communicating your needs and wants to the Federation. Your involvement, your leadership, your suggestions, are what set our community priorities.

So attend an event, volunteer, join a committee, make a financial commitment – one or all of these can be your first or next step in being more involved in the collective. It is your dollars that are important and meaningful. It is all of our dollars together, the collective, that give power to the Chattanooga Jewish community. A percentage of our campaign dollars go to our Jewish Agency to save one Jew at a time. It only costs \$10,000 to get one of us, a Jew, out of one of these at risk countries. \$10,000 to save one Jew, and help them integrate in Israeli society for one year. Think of the impact of saving 1 Jew.

What is our choice? We can open our hearts, we can open our minds, we can listen, and we must act. When you open your pledge card and write a number down, make it means something. If ten of us can give an extra \$10,000 it will save 10 Jews, If 20 of us can give an extra \$1,000 it will save 2 Jews, If 100 of us give an extra 100 dollars it will save one Jew.

A Section of the Talmud says, "...whoever saves a life, it is considered as if he saved an entire world." Our choice right now is in front of us tonight. They can take our land, conquer us, enslave us and kill us, BUT they cannot take away what is inside of us, the Jewish soul (ne-sha-ma) the Jewish spirit (roo-ach).

Always throughout history, and today, with the rise in anti-Semitism, Jews are trying to get "home" to a safe place, to a peaceful place, to Israel, to Chattanooga. That which drives and inspires us to hide in caves, behind curtains, in barracks, lighting Shabbat candles, saying Kaddish, studying Torah is our shared Jewish traditions--not just holidays, but tzedakah, learning, and hospitality to strangers. The thread of Jewish tradition is our identity, the fact that WE BELONG to a people. It can never be cut, and will never be lost.

What we do tonight, and the choice we make on our card, will enable us to hear the stories of the next generation. We are Building Bridges 4 Generations, saving one Jew at a time.

Building Community at Home and Abroad



Editor's note: the following speech was delivered at Campaign Kickoff August 28. It has been edited for space.

I'm 45 years old, and last month I returned from my first visit to Israel. It wasn't the first time I'd planned to visit Israel. As a 23 year old, I wanted to go, but my parents discouraged me because of safety concerns. So I went instead on a two-week tour of London, Paris, Florence, and Rome. It was an amazing trip, and was where I met a beautiful girl from Chicago who four years later would become my wife. If my parents hadn't discouraged me from going to Israel 22 years ago, I would not have met Beth, had the career opportunity that led to my move to Chattanooga, and in all likelihood would not be involved in the many great causes that the Jewish Federation supports, including the Campaigners' Mission, which finally took me to Israel. There I had the opportunity to meet many amazing people and hear inspiring stories of how their lives have been dramatically improved due to the support of the Federation.

One such story involves a project that started as the brainchild of our former shlichah, Noa Hadad. Her idea was to organize a race in Chattanooga called Night Run, based on a huge annual 10K race in Tel Aviv by the same name which draws over 20,000 runners a year. The first race here in Chattanooga, in 2015, raised \$1500 and had over 200 participants. This year we raised over \$4500 and had over 300 participants.

The proceeds from The Night Run went to two organizations, one based here in Chattanooga, the other in Israel. The one here is called Operation Get Active. Operation Get Active is a health initiative that uses soccer to encourage youth to live active and healthy lifestyles, and is a program of the Chattanooga Football Club Foundation. In addition to improving children's physical activity, there is also a focus on developing teamwork and leadership skills. Earlier this year, Operation Get Active also received a \$100,000 donation from the Volkswagen Workers Foundation.



The other organization to receive funding through Night Run is called Mifalot. Mifalot's vision is to utilize the potential and

power of sports to build more active, compassionate and cohesive communities and support the sustainable development of a more open, just, and engaged society. It is the largest organization in the Middle East that uses sports as a platform for social change. Its programs are designed to stimulate community outreach by teaching social values and life skills.

Two organizations -- one in Chattanooga, one in Israel -- building teamwork, leadership skills, and confidence in children through sports, benefited from Federation dollars and efforts.

The idea for The Night Run project is a perfect example of this year's campaign theme, Building Bridges 4 Generations. Our campaign dollars enable us to have a Shlichim Program, which in turn engages and builds community here at home and abroad in Israel.





Evaluate, Energize, Evolve

For some people, receiving an evaluation conjures up bad feelings, like the fear of getting a bad performance review, or being sent to the principal's office. There is a feeling of anxiety, of wishing to just tip-toe around the feedback.

There are many kinds of evaluation feedback. Some kinds are not particularly helpful--I'm thinking of comments made primarily for the benefit of the person making them (i.e. to hear himself speak). Sometimes feedback is good but not necessarily immediate--in other words, it can be moved into the "parking lot," the figurative place where good ideas wait to be further considered or acted upon. And sometimes feedback can be the catalyst for changing direction.

Here at the Federation we are in the process of evaluating our P2G programs, Partnership2gether. Did you know that with your campaign dollars, this program has provided us with numerous exhibitions, including the PSALMS exhibit, which recently left the Federation to travel throughout the Southeastern United States? Or that your dollars help fund the teen exchange program with Israel? And the teacher exchange program in which Rebecca Parker and Randy Weiss will be travelling to Israel in December? Did you know that these funds also support classroom to classroom activities? But most of all, did you know that the staff at the Federation regularly talks to and works with, our peers in the Southeast U.S. and in Hadera, Israel? So the question we are posing, in our evaluation, is, is it worth it? If so, what is it that makes it worth it?

Along with our evaluation of P2G, the Federation's staff and volunteers are asking--and answering-- three specific questions as we outline the Federation's near future: 1. How do we increase resources and diversify income? 2. How do we go about increasing audience development and engagement? And 3. How do we continue leadership and succession development? As we ask these questions, we have to evaluate where we have been in the last few years.

The Federation has done some amazing things over the past year. The Jewish Archives has captured many more oral histories on DVD. The Jewish Film Series had a banner year with more people in attendance than ever. Exhibits have become recognized locally and throughout the United States. Philanthropy Camp continues to engage 60 or more young people each summer, along with local non-profit organizations and adults. The documentary film series has gained footing and now sponsors. Chai Nite, genetic screening, discussion groups, Foreign Policy Supper Club, ADL events, AIPAC events, and much more have brought the community together. And then there have been the programs brought to us by our shlichim, and the sense of community they have helped us build around our support for Israel.

I have been waiting for October for months. It's not just because the days grow shorter and cooler. It's not just because the leaves turn beautiful colors and my nemesis (red ants) begin to slow down and grow dormant. It's because during the High Holidays, programs and activities move specifically to the congregations, giving me the time to evaluate, reflect, reenergize, and, with the help of many, many volunteers, plot the course of activity for the next year. For me, October is a time of renewal.

A twenty-hour flight may bring you to a completely new place on the other side of the world, but all told, it's still not so different from your home land. People are still people everywhere.

On Mistakes I've been here for almost a whole month and I still wish I could wear a sign that says, "Not From Here." That way I wouldn't be so embarrassed to make the inevitable mistakes that are so necessary to the learning process.

On the New Year Every new start is paired with an end. That's the way it is with life cycles. One year ends and a new one begins, a new opportunity opens a new page in our lives and then we turn that page. It's so great to know we have the chance to gather all our mistakes and lessons from the previous year and transform them into new insights and lessons that go into our life toolbox, enabling us to march toward the new year wiser, with many more tools to make this new beginning better—for us, and for our community, at home, in our neighborhoods, cities, country, and around the world.

IDF Home Front Command

Editor's note: the following is a summary of the events of September 5 in Israel when a parking garage collapsed, killing six and injuring 23, and Federation shlicha Shiran Amir's commentary.



On the day the State of Israel was declared, David Ben Gurion coined the phrase: "The entire nation is an army, the entire country the front line." Forty-three years later, on the eve of the First Gulf War (January 1991), IDF has deepened its idea of the home front as an integral and inseparable part of the conflict. That was the first war since the 1948 Arab-Israeli War in which centers of civilian population faced significant threat. About a year later, at the end of the war, the Home Front Command, "Pikud Haoref" was created.

Until the establishment of the Command, responsibility for the Home Front fell under the Civilian Defense's Chief Officer Corps Command and under Regional Defense. During that time, the three regional commands had their own home front commands. After the first Gulf War, these organizations were unified and the Home Front Command was created. The Home Front Command includes a domestic search and rescue unit, primarily operating in times of natural disasters and is the corporate arm of the state of Israel for handling emergencies such as earthquakes or collapse of buildings. Its rescue brigades are called into action in case of a mass disaster events.

On Monday morning September 5th a four-level subterranean parking lot in a building site on HaBarzel Street in the Ramat Hahayal neighborhood of Tel Aviv collapsed. Six persons have been killed and 23 were injured. Home Front Command rescue workers worked for several long days straight in an effort to find any and all survivors. Rescue operations are particularly challenging in this case, since the collapsed building was to be a parking garage, and thus much of it was underground. Ramat Hahayal is a Tel Aviv neighborhood that is home to many office buildings, and considered one of Israel's centers of high-tech business activities. Amir: Seeing the pictures from afar and hearing about the disaster touched my heart. In my military service I was in the IDF Spokesperson Unit at The Home Front Command Headquarters. As a young soldier and as a reserve soldier, I was a witness to all the good deeds Home Front Command Forces are honored to do, not only in Israel but also around the world. They are there to help in any scenario: a hurricane, a tsunami, an earthquake, or a terror attack, whether in Mexico, Armenia, Argentina, Turkey, Haiti, India, or of course Israel. These are people who live a full life, are engaged in various jobs, and in an emergency will leave their routine and their families in order to rescue and to help out, risking their lives to save others. I was privileged to witness their activities up close, the incredible sacrifices they make in the name of humanity, anytime, anywhere. They truly express the values that are important to us as Jews.

I would like to explain some of the specifics of our transportation services. We offer transportation services Monday-Thursday from 8a.m. to 5p.m. on a first come, first served basis. We have an excellent team of drivers who work very hard to make sure that they provide a high quality service.

We prioritize medical appointments, but if there is room on the schedule we will accommodate anything from hair appointments to shopping trips. In order to serve our clients the best we can, and get you on the schedule when you need us, please call as soon as you know about an appointment or have a request for transportation.

Also, please remember that as much as we try to fit you within the time frame you request, there may be days when we have to either offer an alternative day or time, or that you may have a brief wait for a driver who is helping another client. A schedule of drivers and days is listed on this page for your convenience.

Our Federation drivers are part time, so you are only guaranteed to get in touch with them on the days they are listed. 



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
