Bring Fun, Drama and Learning to Your Seder Table

Many people find it difficult to keep children interested and engaged during the Passover seder. Bringing the ten plagues to life is another great way to add an experiential, dramatic element to the evening. Plan ahead with some props and you'll see how engaging the seder can be.

Here are some suggestions for enacting the ten plagues:

- 1.**Blood:** Prepare a large, clear pitcher, empty except for some red food coloring at the bottom. At the appropriate moment, pour in water and watch it turn magically to "blood."
- 2. **Frogs:** Have everyone get out of their chair and hop around the room, croaking like frogs. This is a good opportunity to stretch.
- 3. **Lice**: Give everyone a little plastic bag with rice. At the appropriate moment, open and toss the rice onto the lap of the person next to you. Watch the fun....
- 4. **Wild Beasts**: This is where your creativity heats up. You can use plastic snakes, or put on a tiger or gorilla mask. This really puts everyone in the spirit.
- 5. **Pestilence:** This is the plague where all the animals died of disease. Have everyone make animal noises.
- 6. **Boils:** The Egyptians were covered with open sores which caused them unbearable itching. Have everyone at your seder table break out into an uncontrollable fit of scratching.
- 7. **Hail:** Marshmallows (kosher for Passover) work best for this. Foam balls and cotton balls work as well. Ping-pong balls are great too, but be careful if you are going to throw them around. Also watch your pets!
- 8. **Locusts:** A little hopping before the festive meal will get everybody ready.
- 9. **Darkness:** Have everyone put on a blindfold for two minutes.
- 10. **First Born:** (eternal sleep of the first born): Buy an aqua-colored Mylar "curtain" from a party store, and have everyone pass through the splitting of the sea, decorated with a sign that says "You are now leaving Egypt."







The Mitzvah of Matzah

My earliest memories of Passover are from our family's annual 'day' at the Shmura Matzah bakery. Let me explain.

Inside a nondescript store-front in Brooklyn, NY, hidden behind its closed gate without even a sign outside, is a gem, a throw-back of centuries: Lubavitch Shmura Matzah Bakery – Shmura Matzah by hand.

It's different than the square matzah available in our local supermarkets, which is baked using modern machinery. This NY bakery does everything by hand, from mixing the flour and water, to rolling it out, to punching the holes, and then putting them in and taking them out of the oven. It's the same "technology" that was available to Moses and the Jewish people when they left Egypt. Every few minutes, all the people involved in the process (about 40 total) say joyously, and in unison, "L'shem Matzah Mitzvah" meaning "in honor of the mitzvah of matzah". It highlights that this is no ordinary cracker, that this is special, that this is matzah that will allow us to fulfill G-d's commandment. All that, in less than the magical 18 minutes - the time it takes dough to begin to rise.

This is where I come into the picture. Every year, in the weeks leading up to Passover, my family and I would go to the bakery in order to help bake the matzah that we would use for our own Seder and the duration of the eight days of Passover.

When I got a bit older I realized that the heavy lifting was left to paid trained professionals, but we did a lot of the work too. We washed the mixing bowls after each batch (only cold water, as we would not want the stainless steel bowl to be warm and allow the mixture to begin to rise quicker). We passed the rolled out matzah from the 'rollers' to those making the holes and sanded down the wooden rollers in between each matzah to make sure that the slightest particle of dough should not be carried over from one 18 minute batch to the next.


My time spent in the matzah bakery gave me a lot more than a day off from school, an education about the baking of matzah, and the highest level of kosher matzah. It left me with a few profound messages about life.


For example, there is something special when something is done by a person. A machine can bake a perfectly square matzah, but it can't celebrate the baking, it can't be joyous, it can't chant 'Lshem Matzah Mitzvah'.

And this: when there is something that you love, do it yourself; if you want to develop a love, do it yourself. Contribute not just your time and money, but your own elbow grease. This applies to relationships with family, friends and of course G-d. Every part of the process brings us closer. The time one spends in the kitchen cooking and preparing a Shabbat meal, a Passover Seder or any holy meal is a G-dly experience and part of beautifying a mitzvah.

The fact that I was brought along at such a young age made a deep impression. It taught me that although it might be hard, its important to get the youngsters involved.

Always remember, preparing and planning is part of it. Do it with joy, share the joy with those around you, do it "L'shem Matzah Mitzvah". Let your children see you are joyous, teach them to love it, let them see that it is labor of love, labor of mitzvah, labor of our history, a labor of a connection to G-d.

"As an academic focusing on American Jewish history and women's history, Pamela Nadell, a longtime professor at American University in Washington, D.C., provides a special historical perspective on some of the more disturbing trends roiling the country. The "depressing thing is we are still talking about anti-Semitism," says the 65-year-old mother of two grown children who currently serves as the president of the Association for Jewish Studies. This interview has been edited for brevity and clarity."

Hostein: There's been a disturbing uptick in anti-Semitic incidents since the election. From a historical perspective, when was the last time we saw such an increase of blatant anti-Semitism in the United States?

Nadell: This uptick in anti-Semitic incidents is worldwide, it's not just an American phenomenon. But it's also really important to emphasize that they are only part of the hate that is pouring out at this time. The last time that anti-Semitism was so widespread and publicly expressed was during the Great Depression and World War II. We're hearing terrible things now; we've heard terrible things before. In terms of the amount, it's very serious. I don't want to minimize it but it's part of a long history.


Hostein: As a professor of gender studies and a specialist in women's history, what do you teach your students about this moment in history?

Nadell: I turn to the past to look for lessons in the present. I like to think of a line from a poem by Muriel Rukeyser: "I am in the world/ to change the world," and that's what I like my students to consider. They are here because we hope they are going to learn how to change the world for the better. One of the things I teach in my American Jewish history courses is Hadassah. When I talk about the nurses who founded Jerusalem's first public health clinic in 1913, and the leaders of Hadassah who helped pluck the children out of the maelstrom of Nazi Germany and bring them to Youth Aliyah, I'm showing my students women in the past who changed the world for the better. That's what I want my students to learn. That is my legacy as a teacher."

Supporting Hadassah means putting our Jewish values into action: advocacy, health and well-being; building community in Israel and in the United States.




