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A Visit To Israel and Poland:

Thoughts from Federation Travelers

A visit to Israel is like nothing else. From the beginning to the end, there is excitement, trepidation, comfort and complication. Fortunately, our trip was conceived and carried out by experienced Federation Executive Director Michael Dzik, our Israeli guide Tal Beit Yoseph, and travel agents here and in Israel.

Our group was composed of people who had been before and those for whom this was their first trip. There were two non-Jewish travelers. Our itinerary included holy sites like the Kotel (the Western Wall), Federation/Jewish Agency Partnership stops (the Neve Michael home for abused and abandoned children), and geopolitical hotspots on the Syrian and Lebanese borders. In between stops we ate, laughed, cried, discussed, and shared on so many levels. A trip to Israel does that to you.

A few lasting memories I would like to share: there was an unforgetable walk up the Snake Path to Masada, and the breathtaking vistas on the approach to the Kotel. We visited with IDF soldiers and listened to the passion of their kibbutz security chief. We saw coastline and mountain ranges, migratory birds and green vegetation seemingly out of place in this desert clime. Israel is a land of spectacular complexities, geologically, agriculturally and politically. What is constant is the Jewish will to survive, and to conquer adversity with a mixture of efficiency, creativity and determination. The Jewish spirit is alive and well in Eretz Y'Israel.

We as Jews owe a debt of gratitude and praise to the thousands of now-deceased heroes who ventured to a land unknown to reclaim and renew The Promised Land. Their story is still unfolding. Make it your ambition to visit Israel. Think of it not as visiting, but as returning to your homeland. You will never be the same, and neither will Israel.--*Richard Zachary*

Visiting Poland was bone chilling for me. Growing up and having learned about the Holocaust was nothing compared to my visit. Movies and books cannot depict what it felt like to walk in the "shoes" of those who perished. Israel was amazing. I feel safer there than I do at home. This was my second trip and I plan on many more.— *Dr. Ira Kraus*

On my first two trips to Israel with Federation, I saw Israel. On this trip I saw Israelis. Walking between the front gate at the Birkenau concentration camp and the gas chambers, I saw many young Israeli students, some wrapped in Israeli flags, others in sweatshirts emblazoned with Yisroel in Hebrew. I couldn't help but think that they are living testimonials to the Jews' triumph over evil.-- *Joel Susman*

The Jewish Cemetery on Okopowa Street (Warsaw) had the greatest impact on me. Over 250,000 people are buried there, with at least 150,000 markers. Others were buried in mass graves, as seen in the long, raised mounds of earth. It is a life-size physical reminder of the many Jews who were murdered.--*Jackie Rosenfeld*

Sharing a trip to Israel with old and new friends was fabulous. Not only did we travel with our community, we reconnected with Hana, David and Iftach Meiri in Jerusalem and Rifka and Chaim Gordon in Eilat. These are former Chattanoogans who have remained in our lives and hearts and each send regards. The beauty of the land, the tenacity and humor of the people, the diversity, and the incredible progress are inspirational. The General Assembly, Jewish Values, and Tikkun Olam

The General Assembly took place this past week in our capital, Washington DC, and it appeared that more than 5000 people were in attendance. There were people from small, medium, large, and super large communities. Interestingly, when I talked to people, I discovered that, regardless of the size of the community, we all face similar challenges. I also discovered, however, that many of them are having to fight harder to get greater involvement and financial security than we in Chattanooga are. It makes me happy to know that we have a great staff and great volunteer base that is making such a difference here in Chattanooga.

One of the break-out sessions that I attended was on Jewish values. About 50 people were in it, and we discussed which Jewish values had brought us to work or volunteer for Federation. The values outlined included: Speaking out-When we see something wrong, it is important to say something or get support to stop the situation. If we do not, then we are complicit to the problem; Hospitality-When we take special care to welcome others into our organization and community, we honor them; Giving/Tzedakah-We have an obligation to give to those in need. Giving to others who have less without making them feel "less than" is an imperative in our tradition; Courage-It takes courage to stand up to for one's beliefs and convictions — to stand up to power and authority, to resist pressure to conform, and to be different; Taking the initiative-We look for occasions to contribute to society enthusiastically and swiftly; Kindness/ Chesed-We are instructed to treat people the way we want to treated, to think about taking care of those less fortunate; Tikkun Olam--All the above and more.

Tikkun Olam was the one piece that everyone agreed upon. It is the reason we all do what we do for our families, our friends, our communities, our house of worship, our country and for the greater good. We are told to leave the world in a better place than when we got here. Tikkun Olam—Repair the World-- is the ultimate Jewish value.

Here in Chattanooga over the past year, we have spoken out about our solidarity with Israel, we have opened our houses and lives to visitors and newcomers, we have taken the initiative on many issues facing our community, we have done a great job so far with our annual campaign (over \$900,000 has been pledged so far; if you have not made your pledge, please call the Federation), and through our social programs we have taken care of those who might be in need. Memory Really is For a Blessing

As a child I remember my dad talking to me about his mother. He used to say that he thought about her every day. My grandma Mary died shortly after my parents married and years before she was able to enjoy any of us grandchildren. Obviously, I never knew her, and the only images I had of her were from old photos.

At that time it was hard for me to imagine that he did actually think about her daily. It is only now, as an adult who has lost my own mother (and others who I loved) that I am able to understand. I too think of my mom every day, and that doesn't seem to lessen with time.

It was with this in mind that my sister decided to take my niece Sammy D on a journey to know our mom. Sammy was only three when my mom passed away, and she did not have the years my girls had with their grandmother. She was cheated of the slumber parties and play dates, and the special way my mom made each of her grandchildren feel when she was with them.

Although Sammy does have some memories of her, we aren't sure whether they are memories we have "given" her by talking about my mom, or actual memories of experiences she had with her. So this past weekend, my sister took Sammy to our childhood hometown to meet two of our mom's best friends. These were women she raised her children with, was in book clubs and in dinner clubs with, taught school with and were a part of our growing up.





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My sister Joy asked these friends to talk to Sammy about our mom and to tell her stories. At last Sammy got to hear stories about who her grandmother was as an adult from people other than us. She heard funny stories about how my mom dressed up as the Easter Bunny for a parade, and how she was always happy and fun to be around. How she loved to play with toys and read books and how you couldn't be in a bad mood when you were around her. Sammy was given a card that had notes written to her from my mom's co-teachers from a pre-school where she taught forty years ago.

Forty years of time had passed and these women still had fond memories of our mom. She was as vivid and alive in their minds as she is in ours. My sister shed some tears as she reminisced with these women. Sammy didn't really understand the tears, but said, "Gabby had some really cool friends!"

It has taken me five long years to really understand the Jewish saying, "may your memory be for a blessing". A blessing my memories are of my mom, and now my niece has memories of her own.



Spreading the Truth about Israel

Some important things happened in Israel last month, but unfortunately the U.S. media didn't report on them all. Here's an overview. Please share the information and help Israel spread the complete stories.

- The Third Intifada is already here. The uprising has been running for almost a year, initiated by Abbas and perpetuated by Israel's extreme nationalist right wing.
- Violence resumes in East Jerusalem as Israelis rally in western city. Despite Netanyahu's call to Knesset members to calm the situation, IEDs are hurled at police in East Jerusalem; an Arab attacks a Jew at Old City gate.
- Nasrallah: Hezbollah ready to fight Israel despite Syrian war. Shiite leader promises that rockets will again force the closure of Ben Gurion Airport during the next conflict
- Hamas chief's sister treated in Israeli hospital. Several relatives of the Islamist group's leaders known to enter reviled Jewish state to obtain medical care unavailable in Gaza. The hospitalization of the sister of Abu Marzouk is the latest case of a relative of a member of the terror group being treated in Israel despite a toxic relationship with the Jewish state.
- US veto at Security Council may no longer be a given. With ties growing colder, some in Jerusalem fear Washington's protection at the UN cannot be taken for granted, and that the midterms may further complicate the picture.
- An Israeli soldier to American Jews: Wake up!! I never believed that such anti-Semitism still existed, especially in the U.S. I never knew that the battlefield was not just Gaza, the West Bank, and hostile Middle Eastern countries wanting to destroy Israel and kill our citizens and soldiers. It is also here in America, where a battle must be waged against prejudice and lies.

Why am I telling you all of this? Because you can help. Pass this news to people who have no idea about what happens in the Middle East. Show them the other side of the story; help them see the whole picture.

Israel cannot fight this big battle alone. If you are affiliated with a Jewish organization, let us know you actively, openly and unequivocally oppose the Boycott, Divestment and Sanctions (BDS) against Israel campaign and those who support it. Inform yourself, your friends and families, by visiting websites of organizations like StandWithUs, Jewish Virtual Library, AIPAC (American Israel Public Affairs Committee), AJC (American Jewish Committee), ADL (Anti-Defamation League) and others that will update you and provide information about BDS and anti-Semitism.

I urge all of you –Jewish community members and friends of the Jewish community, to wake up and stand up for the State of Israel, for all it represents, and for all it works to achieve.

We can make a change, even just by learning the facts and latest updates. You are our shlichim, our ambassadors of Israel. If you want to be more involved, tell me! Tell your friends and family what is going on in Israel.

Baseball Literalism

There is a long and often ridiculous history of comparing baseball to a religion. Rule-bound, slow to change, cyclic, and timeless; an assembly of people presided

over by men in funny outfits, who say what is safe and what is out; a space sealed-off from the rest of society, yet definitional to a national culture: the comparisons aren't too difficult to make. As noted in the movie "Bull Durham," there are 108 stitches on a baseball, and 108 beads in a rosary. Coincidence?

Well, yes. It's a coincidence. (Or a function of the exceptional divisibility of the number 108). Religious phenomena have plenty of overlaps with other products of human culture, but the whole game of "is it a religion?" is obnoxious at best. None of which changes the fact that, when Major League Baseball announced last week that it was planning to introduce instant replay to games, thereby allowing umpires to stop play after a difficult call and watch the whole thing again in slow-motion, all I could think, with a tinge of sadness, was that a new, especially virulent kind of fundamentalism had arrived in America's First Church.


Let me explain. Fundamentalist religions may attack modern culture, but they are also, as an abundant realm of scholarship argues, products of modernity. The kind of precision, authority, and certainty that motivates, say, the belief in the inerrancy of scripture, or the conviction that you can prove, through science, the veracity of the Biblical Flood, is part and parcel of the modern demand that things be absolutely correct and explainable—that things should be not just feel true, but be right. Perhaps it should not surprise us that religious violence is so often sourced from engineers, schooled in the arts of precision and certainty.

Back to baseball, home of a new and creeping umpirical dogmatism. Part of the sport's charm is its premodern character: where football has engineered plays and metrical grid, and basketball not one but two clocks (shot and game), baseball seems to obey a different rhythm, slow and summery and defined only by the necessary duration for its fulfillment, and not some digital device. Naturally, then, baseball is a technologically conservative place. Players use wooden bats. They wear knickers!

And umpires rely only on sight to make calls—aware, perhaps, in that way we so often forget to be, here in our modern world, that a kind of truth thrives in the realm of fate and subjective judgment, and not in the absolutes.

Now cameras have come along and ruined it all. Baseball is about to get literalist. Or perhaps more scientific. New atheist, fundamentalist, take your pick: starting next spring, the shrines of the diamond will be losing a little of their magic.


