I am Definitely an Israeli, But Am I a Feminist?

It was January 2013 when I made the decision to apply for the Jewish agency Shlichim program. After sending my resume, I got a life-changing phone call. I

was told I'd passed the first step. I was then invited to a "sorting" workshop for which I had to plan a two-hour program for students. The subject was influential women of Israel.

My FeminIsrael exhibit, which will open February 13 and run through March 21, was "born" from that life-changing phone call. Because by the time I finished writing the program, I knew in my heart that two hours was not enough time to devote to such an important topic. I would create an entire program around it, and in the process, I would meet a whole new world of inspiring women.

When I planned the exhibit, I was looking for unique women of achievement who contributed significantly to the people of Israel—women from a variety of disciplines who left a mark on the Jewish people, Israeli society, and culture. I learned that history is replete with strong women who have helped to propel the Zionist dream of a Jewish state forward. These women broke psychological and cultural barriers, and inspired many others to follow in their footsteps. Myself included.

My research brought up many questions for me, but one in particular stayed with me: am I a feminist? Feminism is a collection of movements and ideologies aimed at defining, establishing, and defending equal political, economic, and social rights for women. A feminist is a woman who advocates or supports the rights and equality of women.

Feminism first appeared when Jewish women at the Yishuv (the body of Jewish residents in Palestine, before the establishment of the state of Israel) fought for the right to vote and be elected for Yishuv institutions. These struggles were called the "first wave," and they heralded in women's right to vote.

New Feminism in Israel (the "second wave") began in the 1970s, and was a period of initial enthusiasm and organization. At that time, questions about the legal and social status of women, abortion rights, and violence against women were all issues at the center at of feminist concerns. Even though feminist activity sometimes drew derision and contempt, it was empowering for women and increased their self-awareness. Jewish women's fight for equality during the Yishuv period was the foundation of the feminist movement in Israel.

The way I see it, being a feminist means helping to create and support equal opportunities for women in society, and recognizing their contributions. It's a goal we should all support. Even though it's 2014, the question of how women's careers affect their family is still a concern, especially in Israel.

FeminIsrael opened my mind. I hope you will find, as I did, all of the women's stories motivating. Now I ask myself: can I be a leader for change? Am I a social activist? I find I'm now motivated to help break the glass ceiling, as they have. Thanks to them, I now know it's possible.





participants. A college-age counselor serves as an assistant when camp is in session.



60 Days of Joy

One of my favorite Purim Torahs (a Talmudic exposition that is just skewered enough to be taken seriously on Purim) is the question of why Haman chose a particular day to destroy the Jewish people rather than spreading the destruction out over a month. The answer given is that Haman was a student of Jewish history, and he knew that if he failed in his mission, the Jewish people would turn it into a holiday, and he wanted to ensure that if they got a holiday, it lasted only one day.

Ironically, when Esther and Mordechai instituted the celebration of Purim, they ordained the entire "month that was transformed from sorrow to joy." It is for this reason the Talmud teaches that when the month of Adar begins we must increase in our joy.

Additionally our sages teach that each month has a particular quality. Adar is the "Month of Transformation;" it is the month that transforms sorrow into joy, and a "scattered people" into a unified nation. The months on the Jewish calendar last 29 or 30 days, but every two or three years Adar doubles in size. These "pregnant years," as they're called, 30 days of "Adar I" followed by 29 days of "Adar II." In addition, the 30th of Shevat is also the first of Adar I's *Rosh Chodesh*. This makes for a total of 60 "Adar days."

The Lubavitcher Rebbe points out that the number 60 represents the power of transformation. A rule of thumb in Torah law is the "nullified by sixty" principle. For example, if a piece of non-kosher food accidentally gets mixed into a pot of kosher food, the undesirable element is "nullified" if the desirable element is sixty times greater than it.

Thus, the Rebbe concludes, in a year blessed with a double, 60-day Adar, all undesirable elements -- every and any cause for pain, sadness, discouragement or dejection -- are nullified and sublimated by the transformative joy of Adar.
