

The True Purpose of Jewish Education: Happiness Re-posted article by Mifgashim*

David Bryfman, the chief innovation officer at The Jewish Education Project, argues in the November 28, 2016 edition of eJewishphilanthropy that Jewish education today should not focus on content-based knowledge but set out to show how Jewish tradition empowers people to thrive in today's world; and for Jewish education to be successful, it must hold at its core, the mission to make people happy. If we don't strive for this, Jewish education – and by extension living a Jewish life – will remain irrelevant for the vast majority of Jews today.

He writes: "To be clear: this is not a call to eliminate Torah or Jewish texts from our learning. Nor is it an ecumenical call that suggests we strip our tradition of its idiosyncrasies and particularistic rituals. But it is certainly a call to relate to our traditions in a way that has not been the Jewish educational norm.

"Importantly the social context in which we currently exist is essential in informing this new vision for Jewish education. We live in a moment in time when Jews are overwhelmingly proud of being Jewish.

"As educators, the best way to capitalize on this phenomenon is to first focus on our students' feelings. More specifically, doing everything in our power to make students feel happy – in the deepest sense of the term. Not 'happy' in the smiley or laughing sense of the word, although the world surely needs a whole lot more of both these days. But 'happy' as in fulfilled; enabling young people to flourish by helping students feel like they are putting forth the best version of themselves. This type of engagement should allow our learners to be fully engaged in their lives socially, emotionally, intellectually, and spiritually. And enabling them to form lasting commitments that bring meaning and purpose to their lives.

"If nothing else Jewish tradition should help people to answer four of life's most existential questions:

- 1. Who am I?
- 2. Where do I fit in to this world?
- 3. How can I live a more fulfilling life?
- 4. How can I make the world a better place?

"Conveniently, answers to all these questions are offered by scholars in the field of positive psychology. Martin Seligman, for example, proposes a set of attributes known as PERMA – Positive emotion, Engagement, Relationships, Meaning, and Accomplishment/Achievement.

"Each Jewish individual will relate to the world around them in a unique way. For some, it could be that the concept of Shabbat signals a welcome break from the frenetic pace of everyday life. For others, it will be when a connection to Israel offers a deeper relationship to one's heri-

tage or people. Or perhaps it could be when Jewish teachings offer confidence to respond to the demands, stresses, frustrations and even tragedies that one encounters in life.

"Jewish educators shouldn't understand their task simply to be transmitting a single canon to a group of learners, but individuating Jewish learning to ensure that it impacts as many different people as possible. If Jewish educators are unable to translate our tradition to the issues that really matter in people's lives today, they will fail.

"While there are more Jews today studying Jewish tradition than at probably any other time in the history of our people, the majority of Jews will only engage in Jewish learning when they can directly see how our tradition and heritage will help them to thrive, flourish and above all, be happy."





power is to "letting go of hate" that seeks to destroy us all. You won't want to miss this discussion between leaders of the Christian, Jewish and Islamic religions!





story The chassidim were gathered around the table of the Maggid of Mezeritch, Reb DovBer, as he told a story of his rebbe, the holy Baal Shem Tov. "It was an uneventful Shabbat by the Baal Shem Tov," began the Maggid, "until the conclusion."

The Maggid continued: Immediately after the conclusion of the evening prayers—still before havdalah—a woman rushed in to the room where the Baal Shem Tov and his chassidim had concluded their prayers.

"You've got to help me, Rebbe!" she cried out. "I am in desperate need of funds to marry off my daughter, and I have nowhere left to turn!"

The Baal Shem Tov heard her out, and then directed his chassidim to reach their hands in to their pockets and give whatever money they found there for this worthy cause. Amazingly, the funds they came up with were the exact amount that the woman said she needed.

"Tell me," the Maggid concluded the story, "what is the lesson to be gleaned from this story of our master the Baal Shem Tov?"

One chassid offered his thought: "This story shows the miraculous powers of the Baal Shem Tov. Even though it was impossible that anyone would have money in their pockets—for Shabbat had ended just moments earlier—the Baal Shem Tov performed this miracle to help this poor woman."

"To show us the Baal Shem Tov's power to perform miracles," the Maggid pronounced, "we have many stories. We do not need this specific story." Another chassid spoke up: "But this was a double miracle: not only did the Baal Shem Tov make the money appear miraculously, but it was the exact amount—to the kopek."

Again the Maggid said that there are no lack of stories demonstrating amazing and doubly amazing miracles performed by the Baal Shem Tov.


A third chassid suggested: "That the Baal Shem Tov can make wondrous miracles occur—that is obvious. However, the Baal Shem Tov could have made all the money appear in his pocket, thus performing this important mitzvah by himself. Yet because of his tremendous love of his fellow, he wanted to share the mitzvah, and thus made money appear in the pockets of all those present. That, I think, is the message of the story."

"May I suggest," the Maggid said, "that this story is not about the Baal Shem Tov at all. I think that the story is truly about the greatness of his disciples. Even though Shabbat had just ended and none of them had any money with them, they nevertheless inserted their hands in their pockets, following the directive of their rebbe with complete faith and trust . . ."


