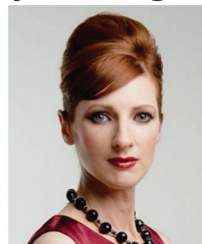

September saw some busy sessions at the Chattanooga Jewish Congregational Religious School. Kids are learning or re-learning High Holy Day ideas, blessings, and practices. On September 11, we had a special Tefilah with Rabbi Tendler on "New Year" and the many new years we all have in our lives. We also spoke briefly about what it means to be an American

on the 15th anniversary of 9/11.

One of our favorite activities at CJCRS is our Annual Turkey Train. The Turkey Train was started in Chattanooga by Karen Stone many years ago and has remained a popular and important community program.

Here's how it works: all students, teachers, madrichim, rabbis, and CJCRS Board Members are asked to bring in two small frozen turkeys. Students line up and pass the cold turkeys from one to another, until they reach a waiting truck, which will transport the turkeys to the Chattanooga Food Bank.

This year's Turkey Train will be Sunday, November 13. Our goal is to donate 60 turkeys. You don't have to have kids in CJCRS to participate. Bring your turkey (or check or monetary contribution) early on November 13th.

Oh--and what do we need to avoid getting frostbite from handling all those frozen turkeys? Why, we need gloves and mittens, of course! So we will also be collecting gloves, mittens, hats, and scarves through December. These will then be donated to a local organization in need. Stay tuned for more information!

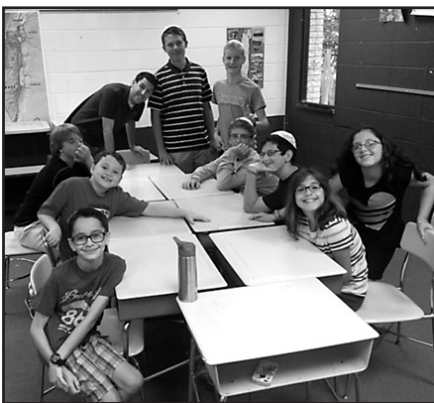

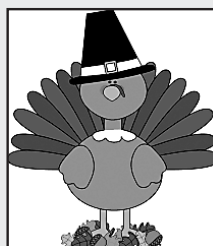

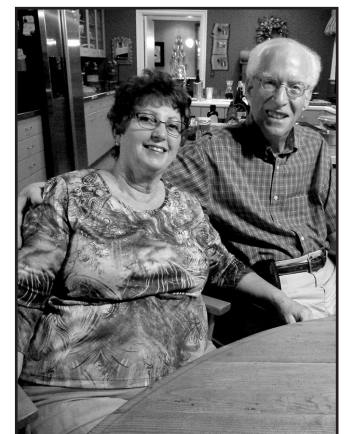

Our Story in Bits and Pieces

The synagogue in Radomsk, Poland, was packed with thousands of Chassidim. It was a special experience to be at the rebbe of Radomsk Reb Sholomo for the high holidays. Reb Elye, the learned and pious chassid who'd been carefully selected for the task of blowing the Shofar stepped up onto the raised platform in the center of the sanctuary. He'd been preparing for the entire month of Elul, and with his tallit draped over his head, he recited the blessings with obvious concentration.

Everyone gathered was ready to hear those stirring sounds, as he took the ram's horn to his lips. Yet, try as he might, not a sound issued from the horn. He tried turning it this way and that, but he could not coax even the faintest peep from the shofar.

After many long minutes, to his dismay, a younger man was called up to take his place, and with almost no effort he produced the prescribed series of sharp blasts.

Following the prayer services, Rabbi Sholomo called over the unsuccessful—and crestfallen—shofar-blower and told him the following story:

There was once a nation that crowned a new, beloved king. In order to express their great admiration and devotion for their monarch, they decided to commission a new head piece for him. An extensive search began for the largest, clearest and most beautiful gems to adorn a crown of pure gold. Finally, a fine assortment of gleaming stones was amassed. Yet no craftsman was willing to set them into the crown, for they were all afraid that they'd damage or otherwise not do justice to their unparalleled beauty.

Finally, one goldsmith accepted the job and asked for a month to work on the crown. For weeks he contemplated the gems and the crown, thinking of the best way to bring them together into a most stunning masterpiece. Two days before the work was due, with trembling hands, he prepared himself to set the precious stones as he'd planned, but he was so nervous that he actually dropped the crown.

Realizing that he wouldn't be able to complete the job, he called his assistant, a simple but capable boy, into his workshop. Showing him the crown and the stones, he told the young fellow what needed to be done. While he stood outside—afraid to look—the assistant deftly followed his master's instructions, and the crown was completed.

There are many ways of understanding this tale, and many lessons that can be derived. This story was recorded with no conclusions, so I pass it on to you, as I received it, open to your interpretation and perspective.

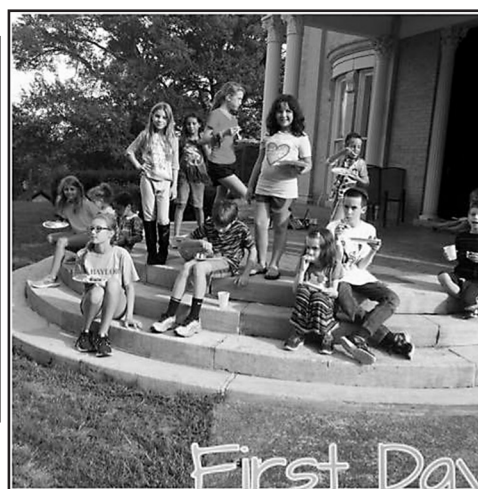

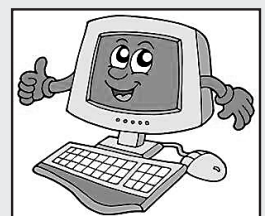

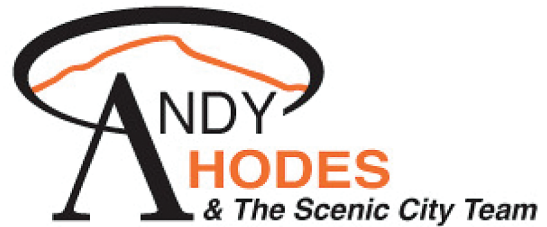
