



What We've Been Up To

September saw some busy sessions at the Chattanooga Jewish Congregational Religious School. Kids are learning or re-learning High Holy Day ideas, blessings, and practices, as well as learning about Sukkot, Shemini Atzeret, and Simchat Torah.

On September 7th, Federation shlicha Noa Hadad visited each class and asked questions of the children, and they asked questions about Israel and Noa (see photo). Teacher Rececca Parker's 6th and 7th graders had a Rosh Hashanah Seder which follwed Sephardic customs. This included learning about new foods and blessings, and how they relate to the service. (A few examples: dates: "to end." What do we wish to see end at this Rosh Hashanah? Small beans: "heart." "May it be Your will, Lord our G-d and the G-d of our fathers, that our merits shall increase and that You hearten us." Leeks: "to cut." "May it be Your will... that our enemies, haters, and those who wish evil upon us shall be cut down." Swiss chard or beets: "to depart." "May it be Your will... that those who wish evil upon us shall depart." Apples and honey: for a sweet new year. Pomegranate: "May it be Your will... that we will be filled with mitzvot like a pomegrante [is filled with seeds]." Ram's head or the head of another animal or fish: "May it be Your will... that we be a head and not a tail."

On September 14th there was a special High Holy Day art program with the kindergarten, first, second, and third graders. They watched a short video and then studied Jewish art over the centuries, discussing and offering their interpretations of what they viewed. Then they created their own artistic pieces. Jewish identity is often most strongly expressed today through appreciation for aspects of Jewish life beyond rituals. Hopefully a different approach to art will engage students in exciting new paths to their personal Judaism.






Annual Turkey Train for the Chattanooga Food Bank Sunday, November 16th.



Let me share with you one of my favorite stories that is found in the diaries of the previous Lubavitcher Rebbe in the name of the Baal Shem Tov:

On Simchat Torah everyone sleeps in a little, because of all the L'chaims, hakafot and the festivities of the previous evening. The heavenly angels, however, don't say L'chaim on Simchat Torah, and so they arise for the morning prayers at the usual time. But they found themselves with nothing to do, because as the Talmud tells us, the angels cannot sing G-d's praises in the heavens until Israel sings G-d's praises on earth. So they decided to do some cleaning up in heaven while they waited.

The angels found heaven littered with strange objects, including torn slippers and broken heels. They angels were accustomed to finding Shabbat candles, tefillin, and similar things up there, but had never come across the likes of these items. They decided to ask the angel Michoel, the supernal advocate of the Jewish people, if he knew what it was all about.

"Yes," admitted Michoel, "this is my merchandise. These are the remains of last night's hakafot, at which Jews danced with the Torah." Michoel proceeded to sort the tattered shoes by community: these are from Kaminkeh, these are from Mezeritch, etc.

Michoel then boasted "The archangel Metat," - referring to the most prestigious angel in the heavenly court - "ties crowns for G-d out of Israel's prayers. Today, I shall fashion an even more glorious crown for the Almighty out of these torn shoes."

Well there you have it! Don't miss this year's Simchat Torah celebration as we fashion our shoes and drink from glasses while dancing the night away. It happens October 16th at 6:30 p.m.


