

## Israel Joins the Fight

In light of recent events in the US and Europe, I'd like to address the rise of antisemitism, especially in the United States, in recent years. Antisemitism has always been here, hovering above us like a cloud, escorting Jews everywhere they go. The

record of antisemitism, and the pursuit of Jews, reminds us of the Holocaust, but it is important to remember that antisemitism did not begin--and certainly did not end--in Auschwitz.

The idea for the "Final Solution" began with individual attacks on the street when Hitler came to power in 1933. Today there are three primary factions promoting antisemitism: the radical left, the radical right, and radical Islam. The radical left expresses antisemitism mainly by way of campus violence, or pride parades that do not allow pride flags that have a Star of David. The radical right, on the other hand, is Nazi par excellence, promoting theories about the supposed superiority of the white race in the US. Radical Islam is a rising Muslim power united in the hatred of Jews that promotes antisemitic messages.

"Antisemitism migrated from Europe to the United States: for the last 15 years, we have witnessed the rise of antisemitism in Europe. It is now felt especially in cities such as Paris, London, Amsterdam, and Berlin. Jews are afraid to send their children to yeshivas and synagogues," says Rabbi Marvin Heyer, one of the most important and esteemed rabbis in the United States, "Jews are scared and are considering immigrating to Israel or to the United States."

But antisemitism does not miss the United States either: "There are hate campaigns against Jews in the world's largest democracy: in San Francisco, Seattle, and Oregon. Every city in America has experienced antisemitism for the past two years." Only one day after the Monsey attack there was an antisemitic attack against a yarmulke-wearing Jew in the Grand Central area of central Manhattan. An American man touched him and said mockingly," What are you wearing?" The Jewish man ran away and the other man chased him. Notably, a hundred people were present, and none of them did anything.

This antisemitic cloud can be found all around the world except for one place: Israel. True, one of the reasons why Israel is not liked (to say the least) in the world is because it is the "Jewish state." It has even given rise to the term "new antisemitism." The word originated out of the antisemitic BDS movement. The proof of rising antisemitism is reflected in the proliferation of "world domination by Jews" conspiracies and cartoons. Two such cartoons published this past year included an image of urine on the Israeli flag, and a blind Donald Trump with Netanyahu as guide dog. But antisemitism in Israel is not felt in the streets and does not openly threaten our lives. Israel has many problems, but it provides one solution: a safe home for Jewish people.

The big question currently is, what can we do about antisemitism? As we've witnessed, it's not hidden anymore. It's evident in our streets and institutions and social media platforms are filled with antisemitic content that can escalate quickly into action. We simply cannot stand by when we are face to face with an antisemitic act against us or other Jewish people.

A new organization from Israel is collaborating with the Israel American Council to combat the problem. It's called ACT.il, and is an international volunteering organization with more than 22,000 volunteers in 41 countries. Their main goal, as stated on their website, is "To positively inform and influence foreign publics and create an efficient and effective battle against the growing trend of the boycott movement (BDS) and the delegitimization of the State of Israel. 

## A Chanukah to Remember




