

challenges.

The past many months we've all been caught up in the challenges that

have accompanied the pandemic: economic fears, racial unrest, antisemitism, and so much more. Sometimes we get overwhelmed with the negativity in the air. And where our thoughts go, our emotions and actions follow. We must change our thought paradigm, our thought habits. Doing so will change our feelings and behaviors for the positive.

We cannot lose sight that there are so many POSITIVE things that are happening around us every day. Are we looking at the good in people? Are we looking at the "silver linings"? For example, month after month the Federation has been doing drive thru events (150 Shabbat

meals served in August!). The socially distant yet physical presence of all the drive thru participants...I could feel the energy, the smiles (even behind the masks), the joy of seeing one other. I too was filled with joy about seeing people in person! These events give us all something to look forward to. We appreciate seeing each other in person; we feel grateful being together with our Jewish community.

We've also seen an influx of new participation in various virtual events. Technology has allowed us to stay connected and engaged, even in this new format. More people feel connected and my gut tells me that more people want to feel connected. One of the many strengths of the Jewish community is this sense of connectedness and being part of something larger than oneself. I hope you'll agree that we are meeting this need.

By no means do I want to take away from the struggles so many of us are feeling: lost jobs, social isolation and even depression. These are real feelings and happenings within our community. Let's identify the challenges, which are many. But let's not forget the opportunities, which are also many. How we respond to the challenges today will set us on a positive course for the future. And doing so can literally change the outcome.

I've learned these past six months that nothing is impossible, because, well, I'm possible – and so are you!

Investing in Your Community

You know that I am committed to our Jewish Federation because you have seen me in *The Shofar* as Campaign Chair and now Board

Chair. I have told numerous stories about my Federation trips and the impact they have had on me personally. I have learned so much from these

from the

experiences, seeing first-hand how our dollars are making a difference in the lives of Jews around the world. Through

three Federation leadership trips, I have been fortunate to interact with the Jewish communities in Kiev, Berlin, Budapest, Buenos Aires, Montevideo and Israel. Sure, I love to travel and the sites and scenery have been incredible. But the stories have been about real people—real people in need. Jewish people in need. The elderly, the youth, the Holocaust survivors. What we do as a Jewish community, as the collective Jewish community, is lifechanging. But what about right here in Chattanooga? We have helped both Jewish and non-Jewish people right

here at home – providing social services, transportation, and meals. We've provided, and continue to provide, engaging programming that helps build a stronger and more connected local community. I am proud of all that the Federation does.

The Federation's most recent program was a Shabbat drive-thru event on August 14th. One hundred-fifty meals were prepared; fifty were delivered to community members – those who do not drive, and some who are not getting out in public due to the coronavirus. What really touched me was one family on our pick-up list, a family new to Chattanooga. They were very excited about their Shabbat dinner, excited to "get out" and meet those at the Federation that Friday afternoon. Unfortunately, two days before pick up day, one of the family members was diagnosed with Covid. Thankfully it was a mild case, but it left them quarantined at home and they let the Federation know they needed to cancel their meal.

Cancel their meal? The Federation swung into action and made sure their Shabbat meals were delivered (safely) so they too could enjoy the dinner and one of their first Shabbat weekends in Chattanooga. This is just part of what the Federation does. A simple gesture to a new family that we've not met face to face, so that they can feel a part of things. This is a Jewish community that I'm proud of.



Did You Know? Get a Tax Break for Charitable Donations

Reverse Shaliach

The Federation is looking to hire two young adults, age 22-28, to spend nine to ten months in Israel as a "reverse shaliach" – an American emissary to the Israelis. The Reverse Shaliach will be provided furnished housing, transportation, insurance, and a monthly stipend. They will live and work in Hadera, Israel, our P2G

partnership community. (See page 6 in this Shofar.)

Job responsibilities will include teaching English to students in Israeli schools, connecting and engaging the Hadera partnership community, and reporting back to US communities in our partnership. Reverse Shaliach positions begin in November 2020 (THIS YEAR).

Candidates must go through an application and interview process. Only those who currently live in, or are from, Chattanooga or any of the Southeast consortium cities – Richmond, Charleston, Charlotte, Greensboro, Knoxville, Nashville, Jacksonville, Pinellas, Ft. Myers or Daytona Beach--are eligible to apply. There is no cost to participate.



I grew up with Jewish learning and I enjoy helping to create those experiences with our youth in Chattanooga. This will be a great year and look forward to seeing you Sundays!





Hadassah Happenings

A special thanks to Beth Thomas (left, RN, who works for the State of Tennessee as STD Program Manager, and Dana Waxler, National Hadassah Co-Chair of Grass Roots Giving, for the "virtual" program on Covid-19 in Tennessee and Israel. This was the first local Zoom program and it will be followed by several more. Meanwhile, several chapters in the Tri-Region will be sharing their programs, and National Hadassah will

provide programming at the Hadassah at Home website.

To all members who have contributed to the Annual High Holiday Card, your donations are going to support modernizing and expanding the Round Building of Hadassah Hospital. Anyone who has not yet sent her contribution can still mail a check to Millie Lander. These special greeting cards will arrive shortly before Rosh Hashanah.

Hadassah's No-Show Donor in support of the 360 Degrees of Healing Campaign was the non-event of the spring season, but Chattanooga Hadassah members can continue to make these donations.

Save the date: on October 7th there will be a Tri-Region Super South Zoom Annual Giving Event. Dana Waxler promises some very special entertainment and lots of fun.

In August, Hadassah kicked off its Keepers 25th Anniversary Celebration. Over 650 members nationally attended this Zoom celebration! In honor of this milestone anniversary, there is a new Keeper level, Silver Keeper, starting at \$2500. Naturally, a new beautiful Keeper's Pin has been designed for this giving level.

Annual Giving is comprised of two programs: Keepers of the Gate and Chai Society. Hadassah created Keepers of the Gate almost 25 years ago and in 2013 introduced the National Chai Society. Both programs create a basis of knowledgeable and committed donors who have an ongoing giving relationship with Hadassah. An Annual Giver can designate a gift to Young Judaea, Youth Aliyah, Hadassah Medical Organization, or an unrestricted category in support of Hadassah's mission. Annual Giving has become a reliable source of Hadassah's funding. Hadassah raises over 4.5 million dollars a year through Annual Giving. The giving levels start at Chai Society (\$180/year) and Silver Chai (\$360/year) and continue to Traditional Keepers (\$1,000/year), Chai

Keeper (\$1,800/year), Silver Keeper (\$2,500/year) and Golden Keeper (\$5,000/year). All of these levels can be set at convenient, affordable monthly

installments. Chai Society starts at \$15/month and a Traditional Keeper starts at \$83.33/month. Anyone who wants to become a new Annual Giver or who wants to "Step Up" to the next level should contact Dana Waxler at: dwaxler@hadassah.org

Hadassah Hospital and Israel are addressing the COVID-19 virus. HMO researchers are working on innovative versions of treating the virus as well as their own version of a virus vaccine. The picture from Hadassah Hospital (below) shows Dr Akiva Nachshon, an intensive care physician at Ein Kerem, who has developed a better device than the invasive ventilator used to ease Covid-19 patients' breathing difficulties. In collaboration with the Israeli company SodaStream, makers of the popular countertop machine that carbonates water in seconds, he developed a new device, designed to be used on patients moderately ill with the virus. The new machine, named Stream02, already approved by the Israeli Ministry of Health, is being tested in a 40-patient clinical trial. Hadassah Hospital has already published modifications to breathing machines on the web for international medical use. It has never been so important to support Hadassah and Hadassah Hospital in this fight against COVID-19.
