FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Your Federation Staff – It's Personal! Q&A with Program Director Ann Treadwell

Q. How did you first get interested in the arts?

A. Growing up in New York, our family attended various performing arts experiences, from Broadway to music in Central Park, jazz vespers to Harlem African dance programs, MET dress rehearsals to parades in Spanish Harlem. I particularly remember sneaking out one night with my friend Hank and driving in his mother's car to take the Staten Island Ferry to see the J.Geils Band. I didn't really care about the music; I just really liked the boy--and his mother's purple Duster with a white top.

Q. How did you learn so much about Judaism?

A. My New York neighborhood consisted of Catholic families and Jewish families. We were within walking distance of the Catholic church and the Conservative synagogue. Friday nights I could choose between meat-free dinners with Catholic friends, or Shabbat dinner with whole families. When my mother took ill, the Jewish families took my sisters and me in when my father was working. This was for all holidays, Passover, Chanukah, Sukkot, Neighborhood Bar/Bat Mitzvahs, Passover and Chanukah.

Q. What past job have you held that stands out now?

A. In the summer of 1974, I was a Congressional page in Washington, D.C. What a time to learn about politics and see some amazing people at work! One person stuck out. I was terrified, awestruck, amazed at her eloquence and incredible thought process, even when I disagreed with her policy choices. When I could sneak away from my duties, I would try to get into hearings to listen to her. That person was Congresswoman Barbara Jordan from Texas. I was too scared to speak to her then. Now I wish I could have several conversations with her.

Q. What career did you think you would have growing up?

A. When I left graduate school, my goal was to be a self-supporting visual artist, a sculptor. After starving for a few years, I decided I wanted to use my political and arts background to change the world, by working in nonprofit or government. I attained museum accreditation for an art center with a majority minority staff, led a public-private partnership for artists, created development opportunities in rural communities, and after several Republican and Democratic political experiences, switched to more traditional nonprofits. Now, my challenge is to work with a diverse group of people to help them achieve their goals.

Q. How do you recharge?

A. My mother's parents lived a block from the Vermilion River in Ohio and two blocks from the Lake Erie beach. My father's parents had a summer cabin in the mountains near Concord, N.H. My mother often said that my personal strength came from being either in the mountains or



by large bodies of water and that I could take on anything as long as I could recharge there. She was right. I live on the boundary of the Chattahoochee National Forest on land settled by the Cherokee and fought over during the Civil War.

Q. What do you love most about working at the Federation?

A. My role at the Federation is that of the gatekeeper. It brings me joy to open the door to what the Federation has to offer. Whether it's programs, social services, or comradery. Additionally, I show the Federation's face to the general public through marketing and grants. In return I get to meet and interact with lots of interesting people.

An Interview with Chattanooga's Rob Lowe

Q. First concert: My first concert was U2 at The Meadowlands [N.J.] in 1984. I was invited to tag along with my big brother and his

friend, and his friend somehow had a private box, so I was feeling like a VIP. The tide turned on the way home when our car broke down on the highway, and our dad had to come rescue us.

Q: First celebrity crush: One of my celebrity crushes growing up was Bo Derek. I mean, she was a ten. What's not to like? It was really cool to see her years later in one of my favorite comedies, Tommy Boy, a movie that also included my namesake.

Q: First car you purchased: It was a Honda Accord. My dad has only bought Hondas since I was a kid, and I trust his judgment. I didn't buy a car of my own until I was married. Before I graduated, I had no money for a car. After college I lived in big cities with good public transportation and didn't need a car.

Q: Favorite actor: One of my favorite actors has to be Tom Hanks. I loved watching him in the early 80s mindless sitcom, "Bosom Buddies," and then in his early movie comedies, Splash, Bachelor Party, and Big. My favorite Hanks' movie is Forrest Gump, playing an incredible character, who despite his steep challenges, achieves the heights of



greatness, while always remaining humble and incredibly loyal.

Q: Proudest accomplishment: I'm very proud of being part of a volunteer team that planned and executed five Night Runs here in Chattanooga. The idea for Night Run came from our former shlicha, Noa Hadad, who based it on a similar race (on a much larger scale) in Jerusalem. The Night Runs brought people

Sanford Winer Stepping Down as Chattanooga Jewish Film Series Chair

Chattanooga's longest-running international film series, featuring firstrun films, and a companion documentary

film series both exist because of one man. Sanford Winer presented his idea for a Jewish Film Series to the Jewish Federation in 2007 and has continued to motivate audiences to attend and individuals and businesses to sponsor. The result is the highest quality films for all of Chattanooga.

Sanford believes that film can be a bridge between communities and has also demonstrated that film can be a catalyst for difficult discussions about race, civil rights, women's rights, Southern Jewry, sports, gender, war, hatred, and love. His high standards have attracted members of the greater Chattanooga community to the Jewish Cultural Center for meaningful shared experiences.

The first Chattanooga Jewish Film Series in 2008 presented four feature films, with an average attendance of 24 people per film. There were no sponsors, and we had no idea of how to work with film distributors or to manage ticket sales. Chairs weren't particularly comfortable, and too much light came through our curtains. But everyone enjoyed free popcorn and a drink--Sanford's idea -- a tradition we continue to this day.

By 2010, Sanford had made major improvements to his brainchild. He:

- recruited several committee members to help screen 25 to 30 films, of which five to six are chosen.
- recruited individual and corporate sponsors for the

feature series.

- used sponsorship funding to purchase comfortable chairs, blackout curtains, and upgrades to the projection system.
- applied funding to rent Ophir-award winning films (Israel's version of Academy Awards) and other national and international award winners

In 2011, in response to growing demand, Sanford led the charge to launch a documentary film series, affectionately known as the Doc Series. The initial audience was 40 people, who enjoyed films the committee selected from the 20 to 25 Sanford initially identified. These films have highlighted everything from the shared African American-Jewish Civil Rights experience, to Jewish food, to the history of Israel's spies (The Mossad), to the impact of Jewish musicians in American musicals such as Fiddler on the Roof and White Christmas.

The Jewish Film Series continued through the pandemic by moving from spring to fall and going virtual with 48-hour windows during which participants could watch selected films. Sanford, who worked tirelessly to get permission from distributors to offer this arrangement, also worked with them to present videoed and live discussions via Zoom following some screenings. The Series reached 163 households, many non-Jewish, receiving rave reviews on Survey Monkey. (surveys are administered after all films.)

When the Doc Series went virtual in January 2021, we had low *Cont. Page* 4

expectations. We assumed screen/Zoom fatigue was settling in the community. Sanford has been mentoring others to assume his leadership position. He worked with Documentary Series Chair Stephen Black, who did a great job, surprising everyone by attracting 85 households, which viewed five films. Almost 30% were households that had never before participated in either series!

The seeds of the success of the Documentary Series can be attributed to Sanford's early leadership. Sanford ensured that the history of the Jewish/African American connection was put front and center, examining, for example, the history of the Rosenwald Schools for African American children in the early 1900s. One such school was in Chattanooga, and one of its students, now in her 90s, attended the screening of the film. This year we screened Sharing Legacies about the African American/Jewish Civil Rights alliance, and followed it with a panel who participated in Chattanooga's Civil Rights Movement.

Since 2018 the Doc Series has also provided a screening about the Holocaust to public and private students, eighth graders

to seniors, in the greater Chattanooga area for International Holocaust Day. An annual average of 175 students have seen films produced by Nancy Spielberg, sister of Stephen Spielberg, about the importance of preserving history regardless of its horrors, to the film Syndrome K, about a fictitious virus created during World War II by Vatican doctors to save Jews from the Nazis.

Sanford created a unique asset for Chattanooga that has run for more than a decade. I have been his staff liaison for the entire journey. At times, when Sanford calls, I am both excited and feel dread at his next idea. While I know it will be great, and he will work diligently to make it happen, it will still mean a lot of work for me. But that's what it takes to make Sanford Winer's commitment to quality of film, education about the Jewish people, and the inclusion of all at the Jewish Cultural Center a reality. And we could not appreciate him more.

P.S. At the dawn of the pandemic in 2020, the Federation used past Series funds to upgrade the projector and screen at the Jewish Cultural Center. No one has (yet!) seen a film using the new equipment. We look forward to the day we can do so together!



It showed me how much my time here is a great starting point for when I'll return to Israel in late summer and how to move on with my life.

For me, this year starts with the Jewish year on Rosh Hashanah. My second year as a Shlichah has started off so differently from the first one. Last year, I arrived in Chattanooga right on time for the High Holidays. I have been hosted by different families and got to join the zoom services of the different synagogues here. It was a special experience that helped me get used to my new environment slowly.

This year I got to meet people in person at services. Rosh Hashanah was the first holiday I celebrated at the congregations in person, a perfect way to mark my first full year in town. Seeing community members out of the Zoom cubes was so exciting, even though it was only the top part of their masked faces. It was a unique experience for me as an Israeli that hasn't been through college yet, and when they reached out to us again, I started to understand more the meaning of staying for a second year. The feeling that people outside of our community know me and are inviting me to come again is amazing. What a great honor.

Covid has made it harder to meet people in person. I am looking forward to getting to know more people in our community, as I've started to do lately. It feels like I would have met a lot of the people here much earlier in different times. This year I want to meet more people, make more friendships, take an active part in our community and even get to do bigger projects that I have been thinking of. Maybe we can even create our own community family tree and try to find more connections to each other and Israel.


We continue to travel through the Torah, learning how it will soon be re-rolled and start again. It's just like watching our favorite movie over and over again. Who knows what new things we will discover?

Each year we get to start fresh, as if we have a blank journal. Our students made their own journals to keep their thoughts, promises, or song lyrics. Being back in our building meant we also spent time making sure we reviewed our safety procedures in case of an emergency. For COVID, we all stay masked, sanitize between activities, and enjoy a lot of time outside.

On Sept. 12, due to overwhelming demand, we welcomed preschoolers to Machanooga full-time! They join us as we start and end each day filled with music, learning our prayers, and sending each other off for a sweet week with Havdallah. One lucky preschooler even gets to hold the Israeli flag at the end of our day.

What does our day look like? We start with Morning Tefillah (prayer) in the garden where we sing, learn the letter of the day, and learn about the week's Torah portion. Then the day is split into three sections: Kita (classroom time); Mercaz (center), our programming and craft room; and Tarbut (culture), where we meet with Inbal, or may, for example, have a learning session in the sukkah. We end our day with Siyyum (ending) in the garden, for Havdallah (separation) and Havtikvah (Israel's national anthem). It's a fun-filled day that meets from 9:30a.m. to 12:00p.m. I assure you that time flies! Even parents don't miss out on the fun. They meet for the Machanooga Walking Club after Morning Tefillah.



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


