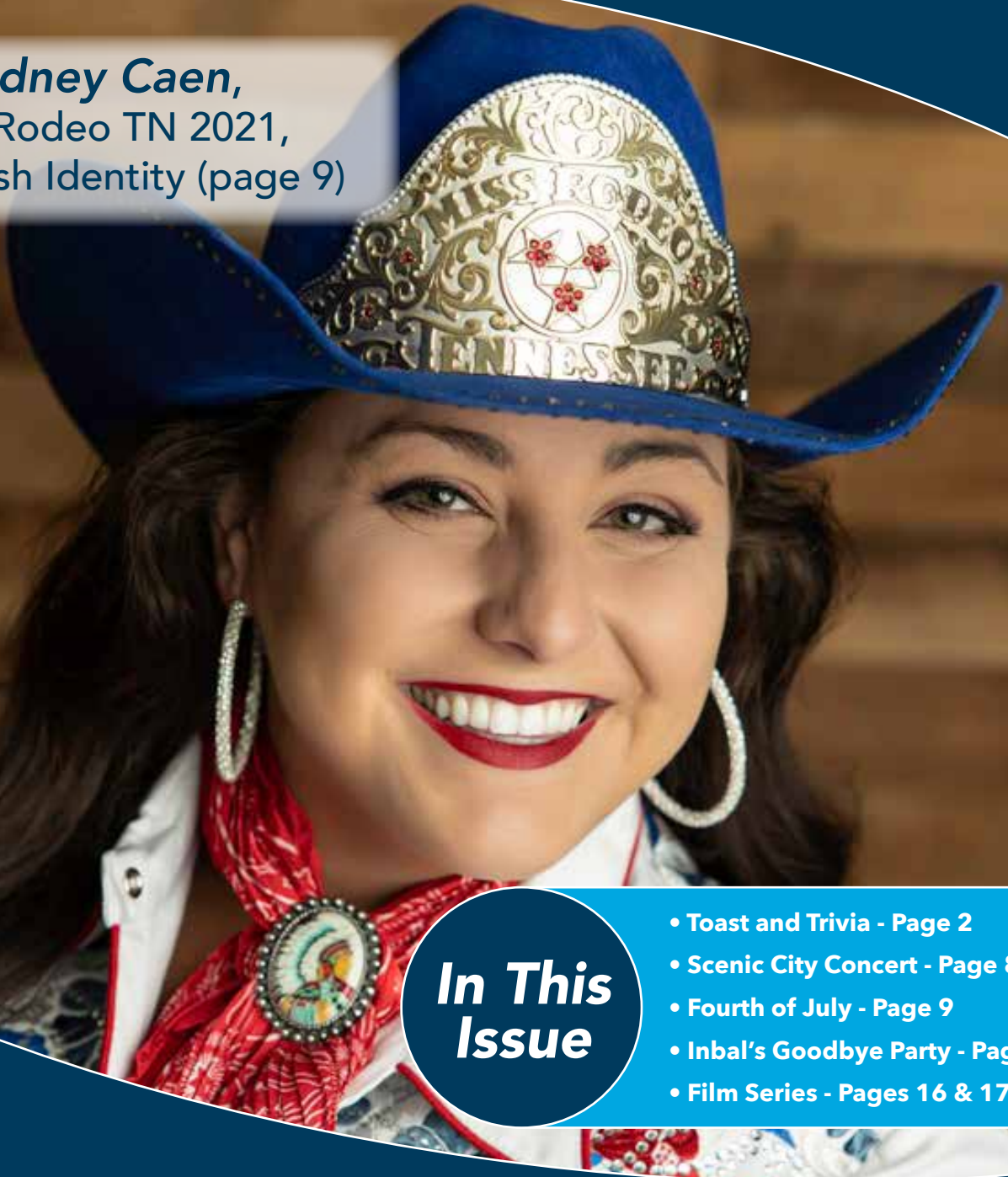

Shaping Values and Jewish identity

I find that family milestones are always a good time for reflection. Our twin daughters, Rachel and Hannah, are graduating from high school and heading off to college soon. I couldn't be prouder of each for their accomplishments and the kind, empathetic young women they've become as they now move on to a new stage of life. I can't wait to see where life takes them.

I take pride in knowing the huge impact the Jewish Federation has had in shaping their values and Jewish identity in the 11 years since our family moved from Illinois to Chattanooga. Our first family friends in Chattanooga were the Cathcarts (Vicki was Aleph Bet Director and Jason the Education Director at B'nai Zion) and the Dziks, so our family was immediately welcomed into the Chattanooga Jewish community.

Our daughters attended Machanooga, formerly CJCRS, where they continued their Jewish education and made Jewish friends. It was very important to us that they continued to have those Jewish connections, knowing they would not be there in their public school. Both girls then worked as *madrichim* (teachers' aides), passing along to the younger kids their joy for Jewish learning. Each summer through middle school, Rachel and Hannah participated in Federation-run Philanthropy and Tikkun Olam Camps, where they worked on various service projects, learning the importance of collaborating to help others. I loved seeing the model "Care Town" the kids put together to illustrate the inner workings of a community. This terrific program was wonderfully led by the mayor of Care Town, the tireless Ann Treadwell.

The girls were fortunate to spend six summers at their happy place in Clayton, Ga., Camp Ramah Darom. They learned many new skills, continued their Jewish education, made lifetime friends, and simply had the best time of their lives. Last summer after spending ten days in Clayton to make up for her Geshur summer lost to the pandemic, Rachel took advantage of an incredible opportunity to go on Ramah Israel Seminar, experiencing Israel for the first time with over 300 Ramahniks from across North America.

Our family is incredibly thankful for the Federation program that offers grants to assist with camp fees, making these opportunities more affordable.

Throughout high school the girls loved being part of the Jew Crew, having fun, learning, and bonding with other local Jewish teens. We're so grateful to Alison Lebovitz and Andy Hodes for leading, planning and executing such meaningful and fun programs. Rachel and Hannah have been fortunate to build strong relationships with several of our amazing Israeli shlichim, who have become family. Rachel was so thrilled to spend time with Noa, Chen, and Inbal while in Israel. There are so many other Federation-sponsored programs — Good Deeds Days, Yom Ha'atzmaut, and community Hanukkah parties, to name a few — that have become family memories over the years.

The Jewish Federation has touched and supported our children's education, development, and engagement with the community. I'm confident their involvement with Federation will continue as they move into young adulthood and for years to come. One reason I'm so inspired to stay involved and to provide financial support is that we want other families to have the same opportunities.

Summer brings back a lot of fond memories of journeys for me. I remember annually being loaded into the family turquoise and chrome Ford Mercury station wagon for the long drive from New York to my grandparents' home in Ohio.

We always stopped at dawn for breakfast at the same diner in New Jersey. Car air conditioning hadn't been invented yet, so an early morning departure was necessary. And seatbelts weren't yet part of the journey. My mother did not go on these trips, and my father occasionally let me, the oldest, sit with him on the front bench seat to keep him awake.

Sometimes we watched and counted state license plates, sometimes my sisters played with their toys and stuffed animals, and I drew in my sketchbook. We ate the lunch, packed the night before, of peanut butter and jelly sandwiches, potato chips, and water. Usually we participated in typical sibling torture until my father would pull over for ice cream at Howard Johnson's.

Hours later, halfway through the trip, we would stay overnight at a Holiday Inn with a swimming pool. My father would relax as we swam, praying that we would be so exhausted that sleep would come quickly. We always had a semi-formal dinner at the hotel. We had to wear sun dresses and talk with strangers. It was always a learning time. People had such interesting stories and jobs.

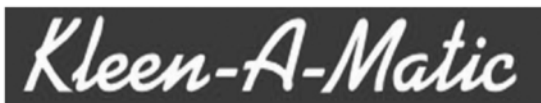

My Last Shofar Article

This is so weird. I have the feeling that everyone who takes on the schicha position says that time flies, and it is the truth. It almost feels like it was a minute ago when I arrived in Chattanooga, confused and not so self-confident. I didn't know what to expect or how my life was going to look. Was I ever going to feel at home in this new place? And here we are today, as I'm starting to say goodbye. It doesn't *feel* like home; it *is* home.

Around this time two years ago, during the first COVID-19 lockdown, I was deciding whether or not I should give up on the shlichim program and begin engineering school. It wasn't an easy decision at the time. Everything was so unclear. Looking back, I know with all my heart that I made the best decision. Choosing not once but, due to Covid, twice to go on shlichut, was the best decision of my life.

I don't know how to start summarizing my time in Chattanooga. And it might be a little too early because I am going to be here all summer. However it feels like the right time because there won't be another *Shofar* before I go, making this article my last. I have already had some other "last times" – last Machanoooga, last Hebrew School classes, last Jew Crew.

I was fortunate to be born and raised in the same house that I lived in my entire life. The biggest moves I went through were between different bedrooms. Going away to my gap year or army service didn't feel like moving out. I came back to my home every week or two. No other place has ever been *home* for me. But then, I took two (large) suitcases and got on a plane across the ocean, to go to a place that no one had basically heard of before! I needed it to feel like home in order to be able to be good at the job I intended to do. Thanks to Michael Dzik, Ann Treadwell, the Jewish Federation staff, and our amazing Jewish community, this place has become my home. Not a second one, just home... as simple as that.

This feeling allowed me to learn, evolve and bloom here. I'm leaving my home soon, and I will work to find myself another one, back in Israel. I'm leaving my Chattanooga home and Chattanooga family as a new person, more mature, more on point, knowing myself better and knowing more of what's good for me. I know so much more about the world. I learned the real meaning of community and the different relationships I can have

with people in my life. I know much more about Judaism and our history.

I am one lucky girl. I got to join the greatest community in the world, and it took me in at the craziest time. And I will forever be grateful. Chattanooga is such a great city, with the best views and attractions, but I think from my experience, its real secret is the people.

It's not a goodbye. Not yet. Please come see me in my last few Israel programs this summer and let's find time to get together. One-on-one or in small or larger groups, we could go on a hike, get coffee, ice cream, or a meal. It could be our first time getting together, or maybe we cannot count how many times we've met. We can talk about Israel, Chattanooga, or just about life, but please, let's get together before I leave (until my next visit!).

Please join me on Monday, Aug. 8 at 5:30 p.m., at the JCC for my farewell party. I'd love to see as many of you as I can to say good-bye.

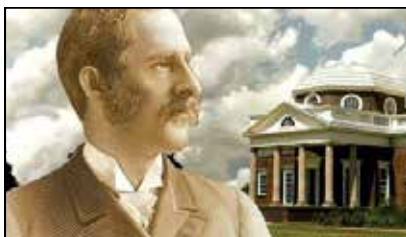

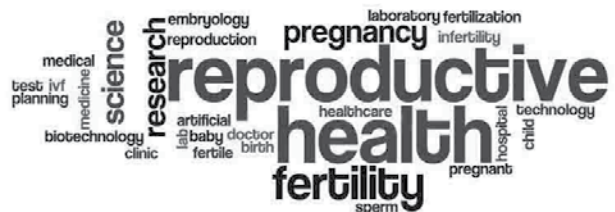

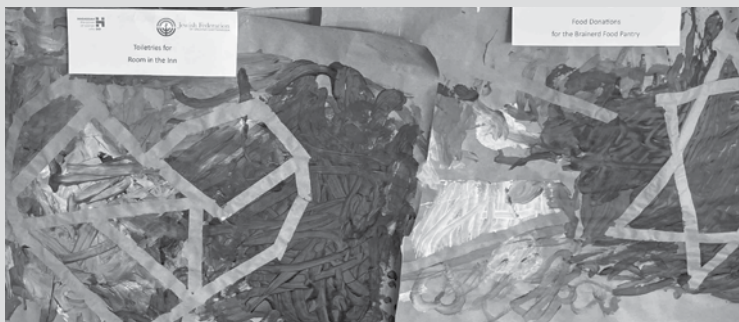
