

Out of Darkness into Light

During the darker times of the COVID pandemic, I wondered how artists were interpreting the feeling of and finding light. I put out a call for art and

darkness and finding light. I put out a call for art and received a huge number of inquiries only to have to email again to say the exhibit had been postponed. This cycle – a call for inquiries (with modified guidelines), great interest, and postponement – then happened a second time. COVID, as you know, has a mind of its own.

Finally, some light as the Jewish Cultural Center facility reopened after the height of COVID and the completion of our renovation, the Refresh project. In the third round, more than entries came streaming in. Now that our exhibit area includes a monitor, we can also accept music videos, PowerPoint art pieces, and videos. From the 200 pieces ultimately submitted, I have selected works from 36 artists, which I think you'll find compelling.

Now a freshman at UT Knoxville, Joshua is enrolled in the School of Engineering.






Adva has been working as a job recruitment officer for Tenengroup.



THE INCREDIBLE WORK OF ORT

As a trustee on the national board of ORT America, I also serve on the Board of Trustees of World ORT, one of the Jewish Federation's international partners. World ORT is the largest non-government education system, educating more than 200,000 students annually in under-resourced communities in more than 30 countries.

In May I traveled to Israel on a mission for the organization's General Assembly and to visit ORT-funded programs. One exceptional visit was to YOUniversity East Jerusalem Excellence Center, one of our new afterschool programs in East Jerusalem for Palestinian students. While no ORT funds are used for these programs, the Jerusalem municipality, which oversees education in East Jerusalem, allocated funds this past year to World ORT. ORT was selected because of the demonstrated success of its Kadima Mada Schools, which offer after-school STEAM education.

We also met with leaders of programs, where we work behind the scenes to teach high school-aged Haredi boys in Jerusalem. ORT helps by giving them a foundation in computer programming, a trade that will always be in demand in the job market.

Other highlights included our tour of Yad Vashem, where we learned about ORT's involvement in DP, Displacement Camps, and with survivors and visited the Beta Israel Memorial, dedicated to Ethiopian Jews killed en route to Israel. We were honored to hear from Naftali Aklum, whose brother Farede Aklum was the leader who proved to his Ethiopian people that there is an Israel, and that they could make aliyah from Ethiopia through the Sudan to Israel. That ORT was in Ethiopia, and that our teachers risked their lives to prepare the Ethiopian Jewish community for aliya made me so proud.

The impact ORT has had in educating the next generation, and continues to have, is most evident at our flagship School, Kfar Silver, in the Negev. A boarding/day school for teens from the most at-risk communities in Israel and around the world, the school draws students from Bedouin, Ethiopian, Arab, and Jewish communities as well as from Russia and, more recently, 35 from Ukraine, some of whom have no family due to the ongoing war there.

Our support-your support- of ORT changes hearts and minds on the ground, making the world a better place for future generations and ensuring the next generation is set up to be productive members of society. It is truly tikkun olam in action.


